## **PVCC Faculty Senate Update**

Your faculty senate met on Thursday, October 3rd.

We still need five faculty to serve on the three committees for Maricopa Priorities (Steering Team, Instructional Programs Task Force, and Support Programs/Services Task Force). The two task forces will complete their work by May 2014 and the Steering Team will complete their work by June 2014. These committees review and prioritize the program reviews submitted by the divisions. If you can serve, please contact Mary Lou Mosley or myself.

I am in the process of reconciling my list of faculty with the approved faculty lines. As you are aware, we received 6 faculty lines from the 60/40 initiative and we estimate filling about 17 vacancies. Once have an accurate count, we can insure all vacant faculty lines are filled. We have been assured by Dr. Dale that no vacant faculty lines will be used to fund other expenses.

Our FTSE is down about 2.6% which means we will be facing budget reductions.

PVCC is moving along with its HLC accreditation process. Special thanks should be given to our faculty leaders who are participating on the criterion teams. This is a huge job and very demanding on their time. Please remember, we all have a part to play whether or not we are on the HLC committee!

## FEC News

CEC – There was only an executive session held since FEC last met.

New Faculty Hiring – The Faculty Association leadership met with Interim Vice Chancellor of Human Resources Jim Bowers to discuss the presentation of information sessions at the colleges to discuss the recent changes in the RFP. In addition, a systemic recruitment strategy for hiring new faculty was discussed.

Meeting with Chancellor and Executive Vice Chancellor and Provost – A meeting with Drs. Rufus Glasper and Maria Harper-Marinick was held to discuss online education and the possibility of the Faculty Association leadership having a conversation with the Governing Board.

Membership Benefits/Domestic Partners – A clarification was made that spouses include domestic partners for the enhanced legal benefits offered to FA members.

Chris Coughlin reported to Council Lee Combs', District General Counsel, opinion on underage students. Combs said that Department Chairs and faculty have the right to know if they will have an underage student in their class but cannot decide whether to accept that student in their class. Combs stated that he would recommend termination for anyone who discriminates against an underage student as this is a matter of federal law. Faculty may be asked to provide reasonable accommodations to underage students and controversial issues should be discussed with parents and the underage student. Lindsay Leavitt, Faculty Association attorney, confirmed Lee Combs findings. The question was raised if FERPA applies to this issue. The reply was if the student was under 18 years of age, issues related to content of the course could be discussed with parents. Another question was raised about liability protection for faculty who have underage students in their classes. The reply was that nothing would happen to faculty personally as they are indemnified by the college. A lawsuit could be brought to the college and even if the faculty member was named in the lawsuit, the faculty member is protected. Council discussed not having to change a class or their curriculum, as the student is assuming the risk of taking the class. Council was reminded that any policy changes need to go through the Common Pages Committee. A draft version for a student under the age of 18 requesting admission was distributed.

Patty Finkenstadt gave an update to Council on this issue. She said that pregnancy (including recovery) may be considered a temporary medical disability, requires documentation to the Disability Student Resource and may require reasonable academic accommodation, but routine doctor appointments should be scheduled around classes. However, issues arising due to parenting and missing classes due to childcare issues should be treated as any other absence from class. Council was asked to send any additional questions to Patty who will collate them and send them to the FA Legal Counsel to research. Lindsay stated that "reasonable accommodations for things will be decided on a case by case basis. Discussion ensued on reasonable accommodations for things like timed exams, etc. Council learned that a disabled student in New York appealed to have more time on the bar exam and won. Lindsay shared that is was a developing area of law. Council was reminded that faculty and administration are on the same side of this issue.

EBAC – Express Scripts announced new formulary changes for 2014. The average number of members/month is increasing. Cost increased 3.8% due to paying more for prescriptions. Increased use of specialty drugs is driving up the cost (\$2000.00 or more per month or only one pharmacy can distribute the drug). The generic fill rate has increased to 74%, but still under benchmark. Home delivery is at 73%, which is higher than benchmark with \$1,037,867 in savings (Maricopa \$728,597, member \$309,269). Inflammatory conditions, asthma, cancer, and multiple sclerosis are the top 4 conditions driving specialty drugs. Copay cards are being issued by manufacturers to help consumers pay for the drugs, but they are not accepted through mail order. Some specialty medications have assistance programs. Drugs that get removed from the formulary will have exclusion overrides as needed. Exclusion criteria will allow a doctor to tell Express Scripts that the patient needs to be on the medication. Maricopa can opt out to stay with the formulary we have and go with the proposed formulary. EBAC voted to go out for bid for a new pharmaceutical provider.

Tobacco Cessation Drugs - Employees wanting to quit smoking other tobacco products were limited by a 30 day window for medications. \$260/person per year was available to help with quit smoking prescriptions. There will be no limit for one year on the medications.

ACA Non-Discrimination Compliance & Marketplace Notices - Beginning 7-1-2014 OYO and OSO will receive the same level of flex credits and eligible for tiers. They get the whole package. All part-time board approved employees will no longer be covered by the Maricopa health plan. They will be able to go to the exchange and get a subsidy if they qualify.

A document regarding Dual Enrollment Academic Standards was distributed. I will post it on the Faculty Senate Web Site.
